Dear Friends of Korah,

It is with a sense of wonder and a grateful heart that I share HFK's 2022 Impact Report with you. Although these pages summarize the many exciting developments and lives touched throughout the year, it falls far short, as it cannot possibly begin to capture the stories, transformations and hope reflected in each person represented by a number. The impact has truly been huge. With God's help it was accomplished through the prayer, compassion, generosity, and hard work of many here and across the globe.

Our work is fluid, always moving and growing. Many milestones were hit this year as we celebrated more graduates than we have ever had from our Economic Empowerment Program, added the largest number of needy families to be sponsored, as well as sending the most children to private school, the highest enrollment in our daycare and youth programs, and we moved into a beautiful new Elders' Home which allowed us to increase our reach to even more elders living within the community.

A major highlight, which will be completed by Christmas is the drilling of the 220 meter deep, high-yield water well at Abune Basilios School. As you can see in these photos, we had a huge water strike and for several days it has been raining water from the ground up. It is amazing to behold! And this water supply will soon be pumping 10 liters per second and providing water to the student body, staff and local community. Everyone is thrilled!

In between all the good that has happened, there have also been many difficult days. Life is hard in Korah, and many are deeply struggling. The powerful and debilitating impacts of poverty, illness, inflation, civil war, trauma, and fear are all very real. Standing with Korah brings hope to those who are desperate for it.


As we look ahead to the upcoming year, we anticipate more positive life transformation as our children and families grow stronger, more confident, equipped, and empowered to live with dignity and become self-sufficient. We also plan to take further steps in strengthening our education and youth empowerment programs by building a physical infrastructure that will have a long-lasting and far-reaching impact on the youth of Korah. As you will read in this report, our youth programs are overflowing. The need for more space, larger classrooms and additional community and activity areas is great.

One big challenge we face is Ethiopia's 33% inflation rate. This has not only had an enormous impact all over the country, especially for the poor, but it has also greatly increased the costs of running all HFK's programs. In the past, we have been able to offset increasing inflation by the Canadian dollar foreign exchange rate gain against the Ethiopian Birr. However, that number has plateaued, which will increase our costs for 2023. We are happy to share that much of what is needed has already been pledged or donated. Our fundraising goal to meet all the needs for the next year is \$637,000 CAD (\$469,000 USD).

May you be encouraged as you read further and see the difference that you are making in the lives of many. We could not have done or do this work without you, and our hope is that we can continue to count on your generous and compassionate support for all the work that still needs to be done... **STANDING WITH KORAH together.**

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HEALTH SERVICES

1540+ HFK Health Services visits

- 344+ Hospital Referrals
- 5 Beneficiaries were hospitalized
- 85+ Beneficiaries rec'd diagnostic services
- 510+ Beneficiaries' prescriptions were purchased
- 106 Families received Annual Health Insurance policies
- 337 Children received Malnutrition Screening
- 192 Children & 30 Adults Dewormed
 - 5 Beneficiaries received Psychiatric treatment 19 HIV+ Beneficiaries received medical guidance and ongoing follow up.
 - 19 Orphaned (13 with disabilities) children living at Tikuret Orphanage received monthly medical prescriptions, diapers and support. 360 Youth received Sexual & Reproductive Health Trainings

MPACT: Health was stabilized and further illness averted due to medical care access, medications and prevention measures. Those living with acute illnesses and trauma improved because of quality treatment received. Awareness was raised among youth for personal sexual & reproductive health

WATER

1 high-yield 220 meter deep well drilled at Abune Basilios School. 100,000 liters of water delivered weekly to Abune Basilios School 7,000 Students and 350 School Staff had access to clean water

IMPACT: A long-term sustainable water source was created for a school with a chronic history of no water and poor sanitation. Water related diseases were prevented among vulnerable children due to clean drinking and washing water. Students were able to access running washrooms on a regular basis. Children's health and development was ensured due to nutritious milk from cows watered on site.

NUTRITION SUPPORT

Additional nutrition & micronutrients given to: Children received fortified pancakes and milk 487+

- before school through the Berta Breakfast Program
- 130 Kindergarten children received additional protein, fruits & vegetables.
- 47 Preschool children received 2 daily meals and snacks at HFK Daycare.
- 58 Chronic or acutely ill, immunity-compromised, prenatal/lactating or malnourished individuals received ongoing monthly nutritional support
- 315 Children rec'd regular after-school snacks
- 611 Children rec'd regular snacks at youth programs supports.

IMPACT: The health of vulnerable children and pregnant/breast-feeding women was maintained through ongoing nutrition and micronutrient support. Those who were chronically ill or immunity compromised (HIV+) and those with an acute illness or in need of ongoing medication maintained or improved their health due to additional nutrition

Family Stabilization

IMPACT: Families were stabilized and retained dignity due to basic needs provided. Each head of household was better able to perform their vocational duties and care for their families. Children were better empowered for academic success through basic needs provided for home and school.

Received daily support including food, medical care, housing, clothing, caregiver if required, special outings, education and support group.

IMPACT: Our most vulnerable beneficiaries were able to live with dignity and in community; free of fear and the impacts of extreme poverty, social stigma, and abandonment due to provisions and holistic supports.

7 Students in rural areas rec'd school supplies Additional Emergency food provisions were provided in partnership with local government for displaced peoples due to the civil war.

IMPACT: These emergency supports led to a crucial collective impact beyond our programs. Local partnerships were fostered with governing bodies and other non-profits. Displaced families affected by war and inflation were stabilized because

of basic needs provided.

> **IMPACT:** Families felt the transforming impact of hope for their future. Communal support and self-confidence increased due to SHGs, cooperatives, and HFK celebrations. Women moved forward in their businesses or in employment due to supports and trainings that helped them better provide for their families.

YOUTH ACTIVITIES



- 932 Children attended HFK programs & activities
- 190 Children participated in Boys & Girls' Soccer Programs
- 110 Children participated in Art, Theatre, and Music Clubs
- 40 Children participated in the Kindness Service Club
- 123 Teens in Small Groups, Boys or Girls' Club
- 360 Children in Life Skills Training 15 Youth in Leadership Training
- 13 Youth in College Support Group 75 Kids in Small Groups

IMPACT: Youth were able to explore their interests and abilities, as well receive relevant trainings and group supports. A safe and encouraging space to play and meet was provided. Fewer youth dropped out of school or engaged in high-risk behaviour at the trash dump. Children built healthy relationships with God, themselves and in turn served their community.

PSYCHO-SOCIAL SPIRITUAL

- 154 Youth in individual or group counselling
- 11 Adults in individual counselling
- 48 Families in family or group counselling
- 142 Youth participated in small group education sessions 5 Adults and 10 Youth rec'd clinical mental health support
- 38 Orphaned and/or vulnerable youth attended 3-day/night camp on Understanding and Coping with Personal Trauma

- All receive one-to-one counselling from social workers as needed. All programs have a spiritual or prayer component.

IMPACT: Vulnerable individuals worked through past trauma to move forward with their future. Parents and youth were equipped to navigate risks associated with poverty, cope with stress, communicate well, and develop their self-worth, identity, and value in Christ. This significantly
